#### **Conservation Awards**

Outstanding Conservation District Award Anderson Soil and Water Conservation District Outstanding Conservation District Commissioner Michael Stewart, Greenville SWCD Outstanding District Employee Award Debra Way, Beaufort SWCD Conservation Educator of the Year – Primary Level (K-6) Tim Taylor, Greenville County Conservation Educator of the Year – Secondary Level (7-12) Kirstin Bullington, Richland County

#### Outstanding Conservation District Award Anderson Soil and Water Conservation District

Over the past three years, Anderson Soil and Water Conservation District (ASWCD) has demonstrated immense leadership in conservation through exponential growth of their education, technical assistance, and outreach programs. In part, this growth is thanks to applying and receiving major grants: Kinder Morgan Pipeline Spill Grant for the district's education and outreach initiatives; NACD Technical Assistance Grant for assisting with Farm Bill Programs; and assisting with securing funds for Anderson County Watershed Districts assessments.

ASWCD has focused on improving their education and outreach programs to offer an especially critical resource for educators and the public because there are not many resources of this nature in the county due to it being a rural, low-income area. Additionally, many of the programs reach USDA Food Deserts. ASWCD education resources include an Enviroscape table, soil erosion tables, free teacher resources and materials including eight Water Trunks, several water related education and outreach programs, a Community Seed Library (9,160 seed packets checked out and 1,830 visitors in 2023), along with being very active in SC Envirothon. In 2023, the district directly supported the public through hosting/participating in over 45 community events.

Beyond educating and providing resources to the citizens of Anderson County, ASWCD provides technical assistance to the public through accepting and processing conservation program applications, performing field visits, as well as designing and checking conservation practices. ASWCD has been a huge asset to the Anderson NRCS Field Office in reducing their workload backlog.

Anderson Soil and Water Conservation District is a resourceful, exemplary resource for Anderson County citizens! ASWCD is a model district that works hard to showcase the importance and impact of locally led conservation found at the root of Soil and Water Conservation Districts nationwide.

#### Outstanding Conservation District Commissioner Michael Stewart, Greenville SWCD

Michael Stewart was elected as a Greenville Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioner and began to serve on February 1, 2019. In 2020, he moved into the Vice Chair position of the district and in 2021 rotated into the Chairman's role. Through his dedication as Chair, Commissioner Stewart was instrumental with Greenville County Council regarding Agricultural Zoning and Riparian Buffer initiatives. Additionally, he is very engaged with the Greenville Watershed Districts ensuring that when issues arise, he personally meets with citizens to hear their concerns. Always vearning for more involvement, Commissioner Stewart has faithfully served as the West Piedmont Area Representative with SCACD for two terms and is nominated to serve as SCACD Treasurer for 2024. Stepping up to the call of service, in 2022 Commissioner Stewart was nominated to serve as the South Carolina NACD Alternate Representative which had him engaged at all national NACD meetings. Of particular note, Commissioner Stewart is the first Commissioner in South Carolina to complete the NACD Next Generation Leadership Institute (NGLI) of which only 7 participants are accepted annually. NGLI is a coveted leadership academy that is designed for those who are emerging leaders nationally for Conservation Districts. Additionally, he is involved with the Conestee Nature Preserve, Friends of Dupont, Save Our Saluda, and Friends of the Reedy River. Chairman Stewart is an asset to conservation within the Greenville Soil and Water Conservation District and the state of South Carolina as a whole!

#### Outstanding District Employee Award Debra Way, Beaufort SWCD

Debra (Debby) Way has worked for the Beaufort Soil and Water Conservation District as a part-time educator for 17 years. When no one else is available, Debby is always willing to serve the district and the constituents of Beaufort County. She has served as a mentor with new employees and continues to be Beaufort's Education Program leader. As a classroom educator, Debby has enhanced Beaufort's conservation classroom programs and developed new ones. Debby cares for the district's educational animals: Checkers, a corn snake for the Snake program, and earth worms for the Soil Tunnel program. These animals provide children the opportunity to truly get their hands dirty. Always being adaptive to challenges, she learned how to use Zoom to deliver programs to classrooms during the COVID-19 Pandemic. She cheerfully represents the district at many community festivals and recruits help when the district is shorthanded. Additionally, Debby has been instrumental in planning and teaching the district's yearly summer Eco Camp where her naturalist and craft skills really shine! Debby always steps up and pulls together all the logistics to make an exciting, successful experience for the campers. Lastly, Debby leaves an impact through her volunteer efforts that mutually benefit the Beaufort Soil and Water Conservation District. These volunteer efforts include, but are not limited to, Adopt-A-Stream, SC Audubon Society, Garden Clubs, Friends of Port Royal Cypress Wetlands, Girl Scouts, SC Native Plant Society, GreenDrinks-Beaufort, and Port Royal Baptist Church.

#### Conservation Education of the Year – Primary Level (K-6) Tim Taylor, Greenville County

Tim Taylor has been the Natural Science and Environmental Science Chair for the Roper Mountain Science Center in Greenville for the past 23 years. However, Tim has been active with conservation education since the early 80's when he served as a Naturalist for state and national parks. After which, he became the District Scout Executive for the Blue Ridge Council teaching conservation programs and lessons for earning merit badges.

At the center, Tim develops and teaches conservation classes for students in 1st through 7th grades and partners with local experts, like staff from the Greenville Soil and Water Conservation District, to ensure conservation lessons and labs are relevant and accurate. In addition to his role with the Roper Mountain Science Center, Tim is actively engaged with the EEASC, Blue Ridge Council, Upstate SC Native Plant Society, among other critical conservation organizations. He also educates educators through his role at the center by hosting teaching workshops. Tim's approach to education is hands-on, inquiry based, child-led learning using tools like Enviroscapes, stream tables, and rainfall simulators. This hands-on approach exemplifies Tim's dedication and impact on both the youth and adults that he serves.

#### Conservation Educator of the Year – Secondary Level (7-12) Kirstin Bullington, Richland County

Kirstin Bullington has been teaching for 21 years and remains very active in her field being co-author to many recent publications, attending and presenting at workshops, conferences, and trainings, and receiving awards such as the SC Green Step School award in 2023 and the 2022 S.C. STEM Educator of the Year by S.C. Tech. Under Kirstin's mentorship, students from the Richland Two Institution of Innovation won an electric school bus worth \$300,000 through an essay contest. Kirstin also mentored a team of students through the Lemelson-MIT Program that invented a new modular solar power system which received a US patent in 2023.

Kirstin's approach to conservation education is very hands-on and focuses on real life scenarios that the students are allowed to choose - frequently centering around climate change and environmental concerns. She believes students do their best work when they know their solutions can be applied to real-world problems. Regardless of the problems identified, every energy project has a connection to energy conservation. As student cohort interests vary, Kirstin's classroom has been fortunate to receive significant community support from environmental engineers, Green Steps Schools mentors, and local grant funding for projects ranging from pilot battery recycling initiatives to container gardening.

Kirstin states, "Although I am not a traditional conservation educator, I think I am able to contribute to conservation efforts nonetheless by equipping my students with the technical skills needed to create their solutions, and by empowering them to see themselves as being capable of creating a more sustainable future".
